<ul> <li>Bill of Rights (1791)</li> <li>Articles of Confederation (1781)</li> <li>Constitution (1789)</li> <li>Declaration of Independence (1776)</li> <li>Federalist Papers (1788)</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Shay's Rebellion</li> <li>US Constitution was being debated in the newspapers</li> <li>States had to vote passing the US Constitution</li> <li>Federalists believed in a strong central government</li> <li>Excise taxes increase, Great Britain tries to increase control over colonies</li> <li>Boston Massacre</li> <li>No taxation without representation</li> <li>Anti-Federalists wanted to protect people from an abusive government</li> <li>US Constitution without the Bill of Rights had a strong Central government</li> <li>US needed a government during the Revolutionary War</li> <li>America declared independence from Great Britain</li> <li>Articles of Confederation created a weak central (national) government</li> <li>US was operating like 13 separate small countries</li> <li>America declared independence from England</li> <li>American gov't under Articles of Confederation weren't able to collect taxes, etc.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Created three branches of US Federal (central) government</li> <li>Government structure still in place today</li> <li>Led to Constitutional Convention in 1787 to write US Constitution</li> <li>American citizens can practice any religion they choose, they have freedom of speech, etc.</li> <li>Government unable to collect taxes, make changes, etc.</li> <li>American citizens have basic protections against abuse of government power</li> <li>Created the office of the President</li> <li>Weak central government</li> <li>Every state operated like it's own nation</li> <li>Convinced Americans to ratify the US Constitution</li> <li>Explained the US Constitution to citizens in more plain language</li> <li>Shay's Rebellion</li> <li>American Revolutionary War</li> <li>America was no longer a colony of Great Britain</li> </ul>
